#### Question and Answer

**Q:** Assuming you are working on a big pitch to a client who is willing to sponsor \$1000 of prizes, what is the biggest selling point of our school?

But then you found out you are \$500 short, what would you do?</p> <p>A: If 80% of things are purchased, then for the remaining 20% I will try to cut cost from there, if it's really not possible then maybe we have to top up ourselves or something like that.</p> <p>Q: You do know that other than CI Club's finances, you have to oversee the other adhoc as well. So there are times where, the way they do things is different and then let's say the finance side of Wee Kim Wee is upset that the Fin Con of one adhoc did not do claims properly. What would you do?</p> <p>A: If like the receipts are gone, maybe they can go back to the store and ask for another receipt. Or give a rough guide on how much things cost, so that they can claim back abit. If really cannot, then perhaps other adhoc they can do better.</p>

### Speech

Hi everyone, I'm Charmaine Wee – a Year 4 running for the position of Vice-President.

The new WeeCan initiative is something that I feel very much for, because it does exactly that, it builds up WKW's diverse culture. Thank you for your time :-)</p> <p><u>Question and Answer</u></p> <p>Q: How will you implement your visions for the school while maintaining the traditions as well?</p> <p>A: When I was pondering about the question about keeping the tradition going, like I mentioned in my speech, I think this is the year to change things up. Not just for the sake that we have a clean slate let's reideate. It's not that but I think some of the traditions don't hold anymore. I think as a year 4 who was in CI in my year 1. I recognise that the uni kids are a different group altogether. Traditional events that worked for us with music performances, karaoke, things might not work for them anymore. And so it's about getting feedback and representation across all 4 years, to try and capture the heart of the crowd. Which I could just cite for example, two years ago in Kai Feng's batch for the 26<sup>th</sup> CI. We did something new which is a post-FYP party for the Year 4s. And I think it was so rare to dedicate something to the Year 4s entirely and this is the fresh new take that I want to make it inclusive and comfortable. Doesn't have to be about the high, the most instagrammable event but it's about creating a space for Weekkids. To do that, we must first understand how the Weekkids work.</p> <p>Q: So all of you talked about WeeCan and so I would love to hear more about how you plan to improve upon the framework that the 27<sup>th</sup> left for you guys.</p> <p>A: How I would approach WeeCan is to give it some structure. Basically because it is new. Not because in a way that puts stress into a fun initiative but in a way that helps to facilitate their growth. Why I'm saying this is because I think for each different WeeCan initiative, there's WeeJam, WeeDance, WeeFit. So much of it. I know there's new stuff coming up, I know people who are like interested in improv, doing art. Without structure, I think it is hard for it to be predictable and I think it is hard for the Year 1s and Year 2s, the new kids and say "Eh, I want to join this new initiative also." To add some structure into it, in terms of how often they meet and also in terms of the identity. I think something that WeeJam really struggled with that I can testify to is that we really wanted to build our own identity as a student initiative group but under WeeCan, we were like figuring it out right, so it was really hard to push forward with collats, with announcements and to make things happen when we had the drive but we lacked the structure to go about it. I think that's one major thing to go about, perhaps one blanket structure to introduce all of it as much as we can in our term.</p> <p>Q: All of you have talked about inclusivity. I've had so many memorable experiences in WKW. There's that feeling when it's speech class and Shobi gets you to talk for a minute. Or the feeling of trying to finish editing your ISP project. It's like on Papa show day, when the applause dies down, and the curtains open: everything we do in WKW begins with a breath.

I think I took those breaths for granted. This year has been suffocating.

You couldn't scream your lungs out at FOP cheer fight. Or sing Start of Something New for the 558th time. You can't go to JHA or Minds, and you can't go back to Luang Prabang. No more open mics, no more beer pong, no more deep talks at the depression at the end of an event.

In many ways, this really does feel like the end. But to me, this is an opportunity.

Now more than ever, we need to answer the perennial WKW question: "who are we?" If you take all this away, will we find that there was nothing there in the first place?

I don't think so. I think deep down, we as WKW students care deeply about things we're passionate about, and we care about each other. But sometimes, the sheer amount of things we need to do can steal that from us.

Now, we have a chance to slow down. We can stop doing things for the sake of doing things and find why we began them in the first place. My goal for the 28th CI is to distil the heart of WKW. And at the heart of all CI does is us, and we still have us. So let's not give up on us. Breath by breath, let's keep coming together to do cool stuff. And one day, when we look back on all the memorable experiences we've had, we will be confident that we took every breath with purpose.

#### Question and Answer

**Q:** How will you implement your visions for the school while maintaining the traditions as well?

**A:** For me, I see it in three ways. The first thing is to understand the original intention of the event. So to do this, how I would do this is I would approach the CI presidents of the previous batches and have conversations with them about what has been done before and why they did it. And so these conversations have already taken place and I have already understood what has been done, what works and what doesn't. And so I think I'm quite sure that I have gained some wisdom from hearing from the previous batches as well as from the seniors as to what had happened. I think my experience of being involved in the school for the past three years have also given me a bit of understanding of what it feels like to be on the ground. And so in Wee Kim Wee itself I've never been in a leadership position other than lighting which is half-exco? Being a GL and being part of the school events has really helped me see what it's like as an individual participant of an event. So I understand entirely the feeling of being lost in the crowd and having all the events happening but not feeling that you connect to it. And I would try my best as your president to not let that be the case. So the second thing is I think there needs to be a very in depth understanding of how the events have been carried out in the past and so being part of the event in the past has given me the anecdotal experience but I will also make it an effort to read it up on all the past proposals and the way it has been executed and the AARs. So I can understand better what has been done. And I think the last thing about reinventing ourselves. The process of reinvention does not come from an old Year 4 CI president. It actually comes from the Year 1s, the Year 2s and Year 3s. And so my resource is the Wee Kim Wee community and your ideas because in the creative industry, it is the people who come who are new, who are not jaded by the system who have the best ideas. And so I will take those ideas and I will put my wisdom on top of that so that the thing can succeed.

**Q:** What are some of Weekids' concerns that you will bring up to the Student Union council?

**A:** So for me, how I see the relationship with the Student Union is two ways. The first way is that we don't just get stuff from the union. I think we also contribute in our own capacity so I think as the Wee Kim Wee School of Communication and Information, what we bring to the Student Union table is our understanding and breadth for campaigns and

communication. And so sitting in the union, what I'd do is to feedback on their campaigns and their communication efforts to ensure that whatever the Student Union puts out is something that is representative and is well thought through. It has to be something that has to be cohesive, not just in terms of execution but also in the way it is marketed and communicated to the wider student body. So that is the role I think we can play for the Union. I think what we need to do in the Union as representatives of Wee Kim Wee, is to understand the concerns that we have and safeguard them. And I think this happens in multiple ways, first of all, Union needs to understand that there is a set of competing interests within NTU and we have to safeguard the interests of Wee Kim Wee but being cooperative with the Union by really thinking deeply what it is that the UOC as well as the Union groups are doing with their money, budget as well as their events. So that they do not take up the lion's share of the budget that NTUSU gets first of all. And second of all that they do not commandeer the attention and participation of the students for their own individual faction. They need to know the school population is more than just UOC and way more than just their own thing. And so that is what I would do.

Q: So all of you talked about WeeCan and so I would love to hear more about how you plan to improve upon the framework that the 27<sup>th</sup> left for you guys.

A: I think the best way to improve on the framework currently is to really be experimental with what we are doing. What we do not have with the WeeCan initiative is a clear demarcated path that has been trodded before. And so everything is still in the works. And so I would be very very open to the ideas that the Year 1s can suggest and what I can bring to the table is the people that I know from Year 2 to Year 4 who are already doing stuff. I know people who are doing podcasts, people who are doing sketches, people who are doing stuff on the side. I think as a Year 1, one of the most fun things that I did was that I got go on set with a senior, who was like, "Why not you just come and act and be part of our thing." I think the experiences gained from that kind of very individual engagement is very memorable and also something that gives me the ability to draw from their expertise. It's about creating a platform for these things to happen between the batches, that Year 4 students can know the Year 1s and so on and so forth. TL;DR be experimental with it.

Q: All of you have talked about inclusivity. Looking at all of the candidates, it's going to be another year of majority Chinese candidates too. So how can you guys advocate for inclusivity in terms of events or whatever that CI does.

A: So I would say that the responsibility lies on the CI to be very cognizant about all these differences and while we don't want to make them prominent so as to exclude people, I think that we need to be aware of them because these are places where we can potentially have conflict as well as it is a possible avenue for hurt. And so I think building on what the other two candidates have said, I think there are some things that are very very clear. I think the means of communication should always be English. I think at the CI level in our interactions that should be something that is set and not building something there is a subculture within the CI is something that I feel very passionate about. Like just because I come from a certain demographic does not mean that my CI has to adopt my values. I want to make it a point and knowing that the power is invested in the CI to represent the student body. I want to make an effort to reach out to the people who are different from me and hear from them. And so what I would be doing is I will be having intentional conversations with people who I disagree with so that I can hear their opinion and therefore represent them better.

Q: Are there any events or initiatives you want to do for seniors? Because in Wee Kim Wee, when you come to the senior stage you kind of just zone out of the events and stuff?

A: So I think the question about including seniors in the events is something that I think the past two batches of CI have been considering very deeply. I think we did particularly well in the 27<sup>th</sup>, when the Year 4s were very much included in not just the event itself but also in CS week where they came in to teach classes and stuff like that. And so I plan to

	<p>continue whatever has been done in that time. I think it is something that's very precious and I think as the president and as a representative of the Year 4, I need to make an effort to reach out to my fellow Year 4 students. I think the burden lies on me as the president to engage them and hear what they want to do for the school. Because I think a lot of times the issue is not that the seniors are not interested in investing back in the school, but really because they don't have a platform to do so. I really want to create a more robust platform and I think the challenge then is, how do we match the interest and as well as the people who want to come but maybe don't feel like they would be accepted. As well as the people who are willing to teach all these stuff. That's on the WeeCan initiative side, I think on the event side, the same principle applies, ultimately it comes down to the burden of the Exco of the CI to reach out to the Year 4s and I think that building something that is not inherently time consuming is also something that might be helpful. That doesn't require you to be present at an event because FYP schedules are very demanding and sometimes you are not able to be present at an event or call in live. And so if they can do something remotely just to participate, I will try to put it in as well</p>
10.	<p><u>Nominee for President</u> Candidate Name: Sheryl Ho Proposer: Tang Jian Feng, Ian Second: Chua Chia Woon, Eunice</p> <p><u>Speech</u> Hi WeeKids! I'm Sheryl, a year 4 running for President. I may not be the first person many would have thought to run for President, I mean, I'm no social butterfly, nor was I the most active Weekid in my time here. But by the end of my speech, I hope you all will understand why I am a deserving candidate and what I have to offer if I am elected.</p> <p>Firstly, I remember 3 years ago, I was in this same exact spot, delivering my rally speech for the role of Performing Arts Director. Despite not being elected into the position, my heart to contribute to student life here at WKW never changed. And so I took on the role to chair WKW's Dinner and Dance in 2018, where I had to helm a committee to oversee the planning and execution of a fancy dinner event to welcome our freshmen to a night of bonding and talent showcase. Those days remain one of the best memories of my time at WKW. This is because I got to work with a diversity of incredibly passionate and talented people. At WKW, every one of you is like a star. Every one of you have your own passions - whether it be singing, dancing, sports, writing, creating, and you know, the list goes on. As one star, you shine brighter. But with many other stars? We shine brighter. That's why my first implementation I can offer if I am elected, is to leverage on WeeCan. WeeCan student initiative groups are a perfect example of how passions can come together for everyone to enjoy. With COVID-19 forcing CI club to take a virtual form for our events, a great challenge is definitely reaching out and engaging Weekids. I wish to use WeeCan to bring together and engage Weekids of similar passions and using the infectious spirit of passion, to build and preserve the strong unique family-like bonds we have in WKW that we all know, and love today.</p> <p>Secondly, to our freshman of 2020, I know that the opportunity to experience a lot of events that you may have been looking forward to has been disrupted. You are also probably feeling very lost about academics, student life, and wkW culture. Similarly for the year 2s who had their exchange cancelled, year 3s who will be going for their professional internships next semester, and the year 4s who will be graduating in a poor market economy. Life for all of us have been greatly disrupted by COVID-19. It is in challenging times like these, we need to realise that we are not alone. And so my second implementation would be to start a student buddy program to cultivate a support system and an open environment for seniors and juniors alike to share concerns, worries and advice. This can also promote interactions between the different batches, which is currently limited due to COVID-19.</p>

Thirdly, CI club is also not just about organising events and activities. It's also the representative voice of all WeeKids. After all, we are the school of communications, and many of us are not afraid to speak up. But speaking up is one thing, and getting your voice heard is another. So for example, every year, The Big Scoop, as part of WKW Engage, is held to help our students understand and engage with the communications industry. This year, it was actually halted due to COVID-19, and I was hearing things from the 3rd year students like "aw man I was really looking forward to The big scoop", and so I thought, why not just have a casual sharing session? So a group of us seniors started a Google sheets, sent it to our Y4 batch chat to gather interest, and proposed to the prof in charge, and even though we just wanted to do it out of goodwill, somehow we managed to get The Big Scoop up and running again, which btw, sign-ups are open now, and I really encourage all of you to join in for our panel sessions. Anyway, my point is, I understand how important it is to listen and to empathise, and thus, my third implementation would be to ensure that your concerns are voiced out. This could be done by conducting regular pulse checks with each batch, through a designated batch representative, more than the current once a semester focus groups the school currently organises.

Lastly, I wanted to share a personal reason for running as President. Unlike the majority of Weekids here, I take a second major in Business, meaning that I actually don't get to spend as much as time as others would here in WKW taking modules. This resulted in many missed opportunities to make new friends. And that honestly is a regret of mine. In my final year now, I really don't want to have any more regrets, and similarly, my goal, if elected as President, is I don't want anyone Weekid walking away feeling regretful of not getting to enjoy their WKW experience. With that, I ask for you to vote Sheryl for President, to help me help you create your WKW experience. Thank you.

#### Question and Answer

Q: How will you implement your visions for the school while maintaining the traditions as well?

A: In my speech I actually mentioned three big implementations. So the first one would be to actually leverage on WeeCan initiatives. So the tradition of the school as we all know is a very vibrant and exciting place to be. And we try our best to include everyone and that's what WeeCan really does. Because it's about certain initiative groups with certain passions and even though we cannot engage everyone at the same time with Covid-19, there is a lot of challenges being brought about virtual form and everything, we can actually use WeeCan to engage smaller batch of students at one time and passion is something that is very infectious. I believe it can actually spread from just enjoyment and getting to people to join new things. So that's the first step of implementation that can help my vision of delivering the Wee Kim Wee experience. The second one is to include more people as well with a support system with the student-buddy system I mentioned a lot of Wee Kim Wee seniors are more than happy to share their advice. So this is more of just a systematic way it also makes sure that everyone has someone to turn to. The third implementation is to have more pulse checks with the batches. This is because every week we have a focus group or every semester if I'm not wrong we have a focus group with the faculty. But there's no like designated batch representative between the batches. Sometimes not everyone knows who to approach to voice out their concerns and advice so a batch representative could actually facilitate this feedback system a little bit better. Especially the current CI club has the feedback system on their Instagram through their google form. But you also have to write down your name and not everyone is comfortable with that so hopefully more people would be encouraged to voice their concerns and make Wee Kim Wee a better place for everyone.

Q: What are some of Weekids' concerns that you will bring up to the Student Union council?

A: So first of all, being a president in CI club, being a representative voice not just to the faculty in Wee Kim Wee but also representing the voice of Wee Kim Wee and Weekkids to the other faculties and so we have to work with the union to communicate and voice out our student concerns. And so my few implementations would definitely help students here in Wee Kim Wee to voice their concerns. So first of all, a more facilitated feedback system can help voice out concerns. Some of the concerns I've been hearing are academics because for all of us this online lectures and online modules has become a very new thing for us. And so for us, not just the year 1s are worried about their academics so first of all I think that is the first concern I would bring up to the union. So I think the social distancing measures currently implemented in our school is not the best and I want the best for all our Weekkids over here. So I think another concern to bring up is how can we manage the school a little better in terms of social distancing and safety measures while still maintaining a safe and fun environment for the Weekkids. So that would be two concerns I would like to bring up to the Union.

Q: So all of you talked about WeeCan and so I would love to hear more about how you plan to improve upon the framework that the 27<sup>th</sup> left for you guys.

A: So for me, I personally did not know the existence of a lot of WeeCan initiative groups. Because I feel like the 27<sup>th</sup> CI club and so it has not been very well promoted, because these are actually student initiative groups, between a group of students who initiate this and so I tend to look at the Telegram membership and so the most subscribed group is WeeGym if I'm not wrong which is like 100 over members. But the rest is like 20 or less than 20. So I think this small number kind of scares a lot of us into thinking that it is a very exclusive group. And in Wee Kim Wee we are all about being inclusiveness. There are a lot of shy Wee Kim Wee kids. For myself I am introvert, so I do tend to not really approach a lot of people at the same time. Like shy Weekkids, it can seem daunting because it seems like an exclusive group. So I think what the CI club can do to help support the WeeCan initiatives is to give it a little more push, a bit of a promotion. Meaning whenever there is an establishment of a new WeeCan group is we gotta push it on social media to let people know, especially the Year 1s that we have a new WeeCan group. And whenever there is a new event, we can give a little bit more support or a cut of our budget to encourage people to go for these WeeCan events as well. And not just within the Telegram group. Meaning that only the people within the telegram group know of this event. But even people in the general population to know about these events. And maybe we can promote on CI Club's Instagram like a story or shoutout or something like that. Because not everyone will be interested in gymming all the time but if it's a one-off event they can still go for it and they can try something new. And if they want to join they can make new friends as well so that is what I want for WeeCan.

Q: All of you have talked about inclusivity. Looking at all of the candidates, it's going to be another year of majority Chinese candidates too. So how can you guys advocate for inclusivity in terms of events or whatever that CI does.

A: So first of all, if I'm not wrong, each batch doesn't have a lot of the other racial groups. The majority is still Chinese so there is a few only. I don't want it to be the case where we select them out and come for the events, it might make them uncomfortable as well. If they don't want to, we really cannot force them. Like I think what we can do is really incorporate elements of their race in events like the other races food at our events because we have really simple, standard buffet spread to cater to all these dietary restrictions, that's one of the way we want to make them feel welcome at our event. Second of all we'll approach the friends of these groups. Especially because you know, friends being friends and then they would just be more encouraged to join it this way, I want to include them but I don't want to pressure them into feeling like they should join.

Q: Given the big incident that happened in your DND term as chair, how can Wee Kim Wee students trust your leadership especially in view of how the incident was handled?

A: So first of all, conflicts are definitely going to happen whenever there's working within a team. I mentioned I was the chair for DnD. And so during my time I need to admit that it wasn't well handled. But first of all, I learned from that experience. We all make mistakes and we all learn so I would definitely want to show how I can learn to become a better leader. So first of all if I ever run into conflict again, I think my first thing would be to really sit down and try to understand that person's point of view because conflicts happen because communications is not being communicated across. So first of all, really try to sit down and try to empathize to the best of my abilities. And also I think one thing that I could have done to avoid that at the start was really to communicate the roles and responsibilities of each person to really let them know that you know, you join this community and there's a row and responsibility for everyone here. Because without you, we cannot function because everyone in the community is very important to ensure the success of the event or the club. So through the differences aside is definitely to work towards a common goal. So I think what I should have done and what I will do in future is to establish the common goal at the start to really make sure that everyone's on the same page, working towards the same goal. Because I understand that everyone has different personalities, different working styles and everything, but we can come together and put out differences for that common goal.

Q: How will you manage your role in Engage as well as CI Club if you were to be elected?

A: So for Engage, we are actually only in charge of 'The Big Scoop' which is going to be next week. So the rest of Engage won't be happening because it's a little too late because Engage is supposed to be a committee of 11 members. Right now, we only have four to five members so we decided not to continue with the rest of the Engage stuff that used to be occurring last year such as a mentorship and all those things. So actually the responsibilities will actually end after next week. So if I am elected, let there will be no conflicting commitments

Q: What lessons from not getting the PAD position when you applied in 2017?

A: So in 2017 I ran for PAD which went to Charmaine. So first of all, I ran for PAD because I wanted to change things up a little bit because in Wee Kim Wee, we are primarily, we bond through a lot of music but I wanted to raise awareness for dance as well because I am a dancer myself. So that was something that I really wanted to try to incorporate. Definitely we have WeeCan initiatives such WeeDance so that has been incorporated into Wee Kim Wee. So for me, what I learned from back then, is definitely that sometimes is not the right time to incorporate something. We definitely have to gauge and see what the floor is feeling, as a student population is feeling so I can propose so many implementations for example in my speech. But definitely these are not hard implementations saying that I would definitely implement this. If it's something that Weekids are not comfortable with or they have new suggestions. It is something that I'll definitely take in consideration. And that's something that I learned from back then.

Q: What are you other engagements in the CI club over the past years other than running for PAD? Have you been involved in school in any other way?

A: So I was also involved in FOP as well. So at the same time as DnD, I was involved in FOP as a GL so that was the other commitment that I had back then in Year 1 and Year 2.
